HISTORY OF PEORIA, ARIZONA

In the 1880s two impacting factors led to the eventual development and founding of Peoria, AZ. First was the construction of the Grand Canal by the Arizona Canal Company in 1885. The construction of the Grand Canal allowed the expansion of farming in an otherwise temperamental and unforgiving environment. Second was the construction of a road, appropriately named Grand Ave, that followed the route of the railroad that went from Phoenix to the Vulture Mine, a successful gold mine in Wickenburg.

Each of these projects brought potential settlers and workers. One such worker was William J. Murphy, a former Union Army officer, to headed the construction of the Grand Canal. Originally, from Illinois, Murphy had returned to his hometown and spoke of the possibilities in Arizona.

In 1890, two men, Joseph B. Greenhut and Deloss S. Brown, and their families from Peoria, Illinois, acquired four sections of land from the government through the Desert Lands Act. This 1877 law allowed settlers to claim 640 acres, or one square mile, of land in the public domain in exchange for a small fee and the promise to irrigate within three years. They filed Peoria's plat map with the Maricopa County recorder on March 24, 1897, naming the settlement after their hometown. These former homesteads are where the Peoria town site was founded and currently lies.

. In 1895, the Santa Fe Railroad was completed between Phoenix to Prescott connecting Peoria to a large portion of the state. This access allowed the continued development of the small farming community with the construction of a water tower, postal service, and general businesses before the turn of the 20th century. In 1917, Peoria's downtown businesses suffered a devastating fire that would normally have destroyed the economy of a community. Instead, the perseverance of the community led to stronger, sturdier buildings being built.

As the years continued, the first half of the 20th century saw the construction of multiple schools, a library, a police station, a fire department, a Masonic building, a church, and more. Then in 1954, the town of Peoria was incorporated and the following year, the first town council took office. The town continued to grow and faced many challenges often associated with the growth of a community but the community continued to grow and on April 13, 1971, the town of Peoria assumed the status of a city with just over 4,700 residents.


Development continued and the 1990s found the City of Peoria opening new municipal and other buildings including a city hall, court building, council chamber, library, sports complex, and wastewater treatment plant. With the annexation of more land including around Lake Pleasant, Peoria has continued to grow from less than five thousand residents in the 1970s to over two hundred thousand residents in 2024.



Now with such a large population, Peoria has grown and developed into an amazing city while maintaining the roots and ideals of years past of perseverance, community, and adaptability.













MEET THOMAS INTRIERI, CHIEF OF POLICE

Thomas Intrieri was sworn in as the Chief of Police for the City of Peoria on November 14th, 2023. Prior to joining the Peoria Police Department, Thomas served the Mesa, Arizona community for more than 28 years, retiring as the senior Police Commander.

Throughout his 28-year career with the Mesa Police Department, Chief Intrieri gained valuable experience in almost all areas of the Police Department. He worked as a Commander within the Patrol Operations Bureau at three different divisions (Red Mountain, Superstition, Fiesta), leading the men and women of each District on missions specific to unique regions of residential, commercial, and industrial uses. For these districts, missions particular to these areas were developed with Data-Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety (DDACTS) principles in mind.

Within the Investigations Bureau, Chief Intrieri had the privilege of being assigned as the Special Operations Division Commander, where he supported a fully complemented Tier 1 tactical team for the City of Mesa while working with five federal law enforcement agencies (ATF, DEA, DHS, FBI, and the USPS) to address violent offenders and organized crime in the East Valley. As the Criminal Investigations Commander, he was the Director of the Mesa Family Advocacy Center while supporting the investigative processes of the Special Victims Units, the Victims Advocacy Unit, the Homicide Unit, Fraud Investigations, and the Human Trafficking Task Force. Before his selection as Chief of Police for Peoria, Chief Intrieri served as the Academy Director for the Mesa Police Academy (AZ POST-certified East Valley Regional Academy), which serves the Cities of Mesa, Chandler, Scottsdale, and Tempe.

Chief Intrieri has been married to his wife, Rochelle, for 25 years, and they have three adult children. Chief Intrieri has been actively involved in his community over the years in various capacities. Most notably, he served as the president of a non-profit youth soccer organization that served 6,000 youth each year from 2008 until September 2022. Chief Intrieri earned a master's degree in organizational leadership from Northern Arizona University and a Bachelor of Science in finance/accounting from Hofstra University (New York).




JEFF CARPENTER






Priority Response



South Precinct CFS




North Precinct CFS









Animal Control - Calls for Service








Community Programs

This annual event partners Peoria Police personnel with underprivileged children of the community to shop at a local department store and purchase Christmas gifts for themselves and their family.





Peoria Police Seeking Accreditation Through ALEAP

Peoria Police is seeking accreditation through the Arizona Association of Chiefs of Police (AACOP) Arizona Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (ALEAP). Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven method of assisting law enforcement agencies in measuring and improving their overall performance. ALEAP is intended to provide law enforcement agencies in the state with an avenue for demonstrating that they meet commonly accepted best practices and industry standards for efficient, effective, productive, and quality operations.

The Interim Accreditation Program Director for ALEAP is Rich Jessup. "The assessment team is composed of law enforcement practitioners from other Arizona law enforcement agencies. The assessors will visit and inspect the agency facilities, review written materials, interview agency personnel to verify compliance with the standards. Once the assessors complete their review of the agency, they will report to the accreditation commission, who will then decide if the agency is to be granted accredited status. Accreditation is valid for a four (4) year period during which time the agency must submit annual proof attesting to their continued compliance with current standards as approved by the ALEAP commission board.", Jessup stated.

A team of assessors from ALEAP will arrive on Wednesday, December 11th to examine all aspects of the Peoria Police Department including policies, procedures, management, operations, and support services.

The Peoria Police Department must comply with 174 standards in order to achieve accredited status. Chief of Police Thomas Intrieri stated, "Accreditation necessitates greater accountability within the agency by consistently evaluating our agency's systems to ensure best practices are followed and further expanded for professional excellence. With reduced risk and liability exposure, stronger defense against civil lawsuits, increased community advocacy, and more confidence in the agency's ability to operate efficiently and respond to community needs, the Peoria Police Department is proud to participate in the accreditation process."

As part of this final on-site assessment, employees and members of the public are invited to provide comments to the assessment team. They may do so by telephone, written or online.




